## INTRODUCTION

- Plate 1. Western Crimea. Survey physico-geographical map.
- Plate 2. Western Crimea. Area investigated by the Tarkhankut Expedition in 1959–1969. A – flat north-western Crimea, B – the mountainous south-western Crimea. 1 – the Tarkhankut Peninsula – a flat and hilly steppe region containing intensively used coastal areas; 2 – Saki-Eupatoria low lying steppe region containing intensively used coastal areas; 3 – Bulganak coastal steppe, devoid of settlements; 4 – Al'ma and Kacha region of elevated steppe with a few settlements at the mouths of rivers and balkas; 5 – Belbek coastal area; settlements here have so far only been poorly studied. 6 – the Herakleian Peninsula and the contiguous vales of Inkerman and Balaklava – an intensively cultivated region close to the south-western mountains.

## PART I. MONUMENTAL BUILDING U6.

However, the horizontal sections are arbitrary; 3 – superposed maps of micro-relief survey and geo-botanical mapping based on surveys in 1969. Horizontal sections 0.1 m; 4 – map of residual anomalies  $\Delta U/J$  based on resistivity surveying of the unexcavated part of the house (carried out by V.V. Glazunov in 1970); 5 – reconstruction of the layout after the excavations in 1969–1970 and resistivity surveys of 1970 (1<sup>st</sup> variant drawn by V.V. Glazunov); 6 – plan of the buried structures (excavations of 1969–1971); 7 – corrected reconstruction of the plan based on the excavations of 1971 and the resistivity survey of 1970 (2<sup>nd</sup> variant drawn by V.V. Glazunov in 1971); 8 – the actual plan of buried structures after excavation; 9 – map of micro-relief. Horizontal sections 0.1 m. Survey of 1969; 10 – resistivity survey apparatus ANCh-1.

Archaeological geo-botanical mapping. 1, *a* – earthen bank with dense growth of wormwood and wild cereals round the periphery of the buried house (over the ruined rooms), *b* – depression in the centre with sparse growth of grass (over the courtyard); 2 – traces of a buried wall discernible by the height and density of the grass covering it (T – T1); 3 – changes in the height and density of grass (feathergrass and wild cereals) over the buried foundations of walls; 4 – preliminary scheme of the building's layout based on the archaeological-botanical surveys.

A – the general layout of house U6. 1 – walls of the first building period (about 320–300 B.C.); 2 – walls of the second building period (about 300–270 B.C.); 3 – blocked doorways; 4 – stone pavements and paved paths; 5 – traces and remains of disassembled, rebuilt or non-preserved walls; 6 – floors of crumbled lime mixed with clayey mortar; 7 – hearths and fireplaces; 8 – human skeleton remains. B – stratigraphy.

General view from SE; 2 – rooms 25–35 on the south-eastern side of the courtyard. The first and second building periods. ## DETAILED DESCRIPTION

- Plate 17. Rooms 1–2. 1 – plan; 2 – room 1, general view from SW; 3 – the base of the hearth after the removal of the clay covering layer; 4 – room 2. The south-western facade of the socle of the wall between rooms 2 and 1, 35. The first building period. View from NE.
- Plate 18. Rooms 1–3. 1 – plan; 2 – rooms 2 and 3. Excavations at the floor level. View from NW; 3 – threshold of the entrance to room 2 from room 35. Seen from above; 4 – room 3. Remains of plaster with whitewashing on the socle of the SW wall. View from NE.
- Plate 19. Room 3. 1 – the moment of clearing the accumulation of pottery over the floor. View from NW; 2 – Chersonesean bowl **C 81** in which a number of *astragals* were stored; 3 – ram *astragals* from the bowl **C 81**.
- Plate 20. 1 – rooms 4 and 5. View from W; 2 – rooms 7–11. General view from NE; 3 – ceramic grog from room 7.
- Plate 21. Room 12. 1 – structure of a round hearth which had collapsed and fallen from the second storey. View from SW; 2 – remains of stone facing to the foundation of a round hearth. View from above; 3–4 – stone vessel **L 29** *in situ* on the floor in the northern part of the room.
- Plate 22. Room 12. 1 – view from W; 2 – view from NW towards the socle of the south-eastern wall (height 1.10 m) and the altar **G 3a**; 3 – portable ceramic altar **G 7** *in situ*.
- Plate 23. Room 13. 1 – view from W during the process of excavation; 2 – plan of the collapsed mud-brick wall and the position of the male skeleton on the floor.
- Plate 24. Room 13. The accumulation of broken amphorae and the remains of a skeleton during clearing; 2 – clearing of the skeleton. Detail: a penetrating round wound to the skull is visible.
- Plate 25. Room 14. 1 – altar **G 3**, relief **G 1** representing Herakles, ritual vessel **G 14** and amphora **Ad 81** *in situ*. View from N; 2 – the western corner with the entrance to room 12. View from E.
- Plate 26. Room 14. Plan. Non-contemporary walls of the 1<sup>st</sup>–3<sup>rd</sup> building phases and positions of the finds *in situ* are shown.
- Plate 27. 1 – room 15. The second building period. View from N-NE. The pedestal of a stele was used in the masonry of the socle; 2 – rooms 16, 17, and 18 and the gate. The first and second building periods. View from W-SW; 3 – rooms 18 and 19 and the gate. The second building period. View from NW.
- Plate 28. 1 – rooms 19–20 during the excavation. The first (room 20) and second (room 19) building periods. View from W; 2 – room 20. View from SE; 3 – stone threshold in the doorway of the entrance of room 19 from the courtyard; 4 – the base of a round hearth constructed from fragments of Sinopean tiles and walls of amphorae in room 19.
- Plate 29. 1 – room 21. The second building period. View from SE. A limestone trough *in situ* on the stone floor; 2 – rooms 21, 22, and 23. The first and second building periods. View from S; 3 – the threshold of the doorway between room 22 and room 21. View from SW.
- Plate 30. 1 – rooms 21–24. The first and second building periods. View from S; 2 – room 23 with room 26 behind. The second building period. In the background – rooms 29 and 30 of the first building period. View from W.

- Plate 31. 1 – Terracotta figurine **F 8** *in situ* on the floor in the western corner of the room 23; 2 – room 24. The first building period. View from SW. In the foreground on the left is room 25 of the second building period.
- Plate 32. 1 – room 25, view from NE; 2 – rooms 28–30 (the first building period), to the left rooms 25–27 (the second building period). View from SW; 3 – finds *in situ* on the floor of room 29. Detail.
- Plate 33. The lower part of a stone press from room 28. 1 – *in situ*, at the beginning of the clearing. View from SW; 2 – *in situ*, after clearing. View from NW; 3 – general view (restored).
- Plate 34. Rooms 28–31 of the first building period. View from NE, from room 31; 2 – room 32, view from W.
- Plate 35. 1 – room 33. The second building period. View from W; 2 – the stone weight from a wine-press in the blocking fill of the doorway leading to room 33 from the courtyard. View from W; 3 – the same. View from E, from room 33.
- Plate 36. 1 – the base of a round hearth constructed of fragments of Sinopean tiles and walls of Chersonesean amphorae in room 33; 2 – necklace made from pierced scallops (*Pecten*) from room 34; 3 – shells of *Pecten* from a pile found in room 15.
- Plate 37. Gate. 1 – general view from SW; 2 – the beginning of the excavation. At the sides of the pylons there are stones from the collapsed masonry of the second storey; 3 – accumulation of pottery in the doorway of the second building period.
- Plate 38. Courtyard. 1 – the north-western half. View from NW. Rooms 9 and 10 in the foreground; 2 – the south-eastern half. View from NE. Room 4 in the foreground; 3 – the western corner. Entrances to rooms 11 and 14. View from E.
- Plate 39. Courtyard. 1 – stone pavement in the southern corner of the courtyard. The second building period; 2 – pavements near the entrances to rooms of the second building period ranged along the SW side of the courtyard; 3 – the process of clearing of the courtyard. Seen working are students from the Leningrad and Saratov Universities.
- Plate 40. Well. 1 – general view from N; 2 – the mouth of the well, view from NW; 3 – plan and sections.
- Plate 41. Courtyard, the northern part, accumulation 2. 1-2 – finds *in situ* after clearing; 3-4 – details of accumulation 2, *in situ*.
- Plate 42. Courtyard. The north-western half. Accumulation 3. 1 – finds *in situ* from S after clearing; 2-3 – details of accumulation 3 *in situ*.
